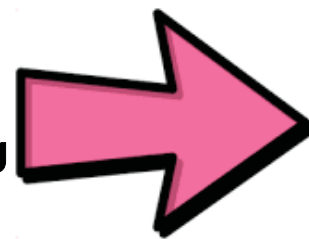

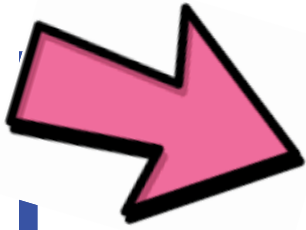

Notes from Archives

Memories of Conventions and Conferences as an AAUW Member

A letter regarding Colorado's Archives was distributed to each branch at the September 2016 Leadership Conference in Colorado Springs. It detailed all information needed in relation to viewing our collection as well as submitting material to the archives at the Denver Public Libraries Western History/Genealogy Department. I will be happy to relay any further information if, and when, it is needed.

FYI: On the back cover of the Summer 2016 issue of AAUW's *Outlook Magazine* the picture, "From their Archives," depicts the June 1963 National Convention held in Denver at the Denver Hilton. The following material, taken from Colorado AAUW 75-Year History, 1926-2001, adds some local information to that stated with the picture. (The first National Convention in Denver was held June 1939 at the Shirley-Savoy Hotel.)

June 1963 brought the Association Convention to Denver for the second time. The theme "**A Structure for Our Purpose**" signaled a new direction for AAUW, into a study and action organization. Branches were encouraged to discuss "emerging issues" and to identify future study topics. This was still basically a "study" approach at the expense of action.

The meetings, held at the Denver Hilton, included a banquet at the Denver Country Club, a luncheon at the Brown Palace Hotel, and a barbecue and Colorado history pageant at the Red Rocks amphitheater. Among topics discussed by the 2,000 delegates were: "Expectations for Education," "Bridging the Gap Between Science, and the Layman," and "The American Family in a Changing World."

The delegation approved an admission change, which stated that any woman with a baccalaureate degree from a four-year accredited college or university was eligible to join AAUW. This change extended membership to those having degrees in home economics, nursing, and education and erased the strict liberal arts requirement. The women in the 60's and 70's had little in common with the organization founders. It is interesting to note that up until the late 1950s the organization's leadership was still dominated by women with PhDs.

I remember:

- -Attending National Conventions and Regional Conferences since the early 1960's, and which took place in Washington DC, Minneapolis, San Francisco, Albuquerque, Phoenix, Colorado Springs, Scottsdale, Houston, Salt Lake, Reno and others I have forgotten.
- -Attending most of these with Judy (Hertneky) Sanderson because we liked to either go ahead of – or stay after – the meeting and go sightseeing. The places we were able to go, therefore, would fill another essay.
- -Listening through two consecutive National Conventions to the arguments, pro and con, for letting men join. Most interesting. Also hearing, for the first time, suggestions to have those with less than a four year degree be eligible for membership: considered were those with an AB or AA degree or nursing degree. Only recently has this become policy.
- -Listening to some of my heroines speak in General Assembly or at Foundation Night. Two were Admiral Grace Hopper and Wilma Mankiller.
- -Visiting, in the National's Capital, the new memorial which had just (and finally) been opened to honor all women who had served in the military. Our docent that day was a retired general, and she could still fit into her uniform.
- -For sheer outrageous variety, the San Francisco Convention was the most memorable. Judy and I went a week early, and I showed her the San Francisco I knew from having lived there a few years earlier. We had a great time.

Then Convention started; most attendees stayed in the Convention Headquarters Hotel (Judy and I didn't). We were warned not to go out at night in ones or twos – only in larger groups. That depressed me as I used to walk home alone a mile or more at night after ushering at the opera Center. Busses took conventioners from the hotel to the San Francisco Municipal Center, a square of several blocks' dimensions, with the Convention Hall on one side, facing city government buildings, and with a large park in the middle. That weekend was the annual gay parade. This had not been going on for too many years, and it was before "Gay Pride" and "Rainbow Coalition" and other such phrases had been created and attached to the parade and this life style. One unforgettable sight was of the six-foot plus fellow dressed in the most gorgeous wedding outfit, from shoes to veil, but with an almost gross over-abundance of make up especially the bright red lipstick. At the other end of the spectrum were those who wore the briefest of thongs, if there was even that much material in them to be called thongs. I have wondered, from time to time, what report the four ladies from Iowa gave after going home? They had sat in silence on the bus watching the rowdy hundreds gathered in the park just across the driveway from the Convention Center.

The Marquis on the Convention Center said – in very large lettering – WELCOME AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN. The media were there, of course, and on the evening news one could see this welcoming sign, backed by the hundreds of parade/party goers milling around in the park.

It was at the San Francisco Convention that I became a Life Member.

Membership Highlights

- ✓ New Colorado Membership VPs sent out an Introduction memo to branch membership chairs;
- ✓ Mailed out AAUW Colorado MAL list to all branch membership chairs approximately 700 MAL on list;
- ✓ Sent out Fall Leadership Conference notification to all MAL members;
- ✓ Had one initial membership meeting with previous Colorado membership vice president, Stormy McDonald, to understand Membership VP responsibilities and expectations;
- ✓ Attended Fall Leadership Conference to introduce Membership goals for 2016-17;
- ✓ Updated each branch membership roster to compare increase/decrease with 2015 to date.
- ✓ Identified two branches to visits for November and made plans to visit 5 more in January-June 2017 (rest of branch visits in 2017-18);
- ✓ Sent letters to branch membership chairs from Terry and me to identify potential members to participate in Colorado membership committee.

Just four months into the new fiscal year, AAUW Colorado is moving forward with increasing membership. Below is a listing of the current branch membership status. In the white columns are the figures from the previous AAUW Colorado branches ending in June 30, 2016. In the beige column are the membership numbers since October 17, 2016, the new Colorado State year. Branch membership vice presidents have been working hard to increase their rosters to meet or exceed last year's membership numbers. Littleton-South Metro branch takes the lead in increasing membership numbers. However, we aren't done! Longmont

 After 62 years of working together to get books into the hands of the community, working to raise almost \$400,000 for scholarships and community action grants, which are now self-funding, we have retired our Bargain Book Fair. A party was held November 5 at Barbed Wire Books to celebrate our accomplishments and to honor the people who made it happen. This year, a Community Action Grant was awarded to Intercambio Uniting Communities. This has enabled 24 immigrant mothers in Longmont to attend English classes with Intercambio, which also provides childcare. Continuing to support Community Action Grant recipients, on October 1, six branch members volunteered at the Safe Shelter/LEVI 5k race/walk in observance of Domestic Violence Awareness Month. We continue to work with Front Range Community College, tabling at the Campus and Community Resource Fair in August, providing mentors for students in the leadership programs; and serving on the planning board for the FRCC event, Take Back the Night, scheduled for April. Lastly, an open letter, encouraging women to vote, was published in several local newspapers and was posted on our Facebook page.


Littleton-South Metro

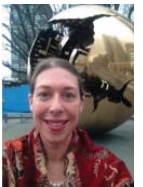
 Community Giving is a major focus for the Littleton-South Metro Branch. On November 4, the Branch presented a check of \$1,500 to Sheridan High School to support young women in the Inspire Program. This program sends 12-15 junior students to Colorado State University for 3-4 days each summer to include them in college life and to encourage them to consider college as a significant opportunity to pursue. The intent is to “inspire” these students to attend college and to also “inspire” their peers to do the same. On December 3, the branch will conduct a fund raising for AAUW funds. The program will feature Emily Dolezal, volunteer program manager at Ten Thousand Villages. Ten Thousand Villages is an international agency that creates opportunities for artisans in developing countries to earn income by bringing their products and stories to market through long-term, fair trading relationships. The program will be held at Highlands Ranch Library.

Durango

 2016-2017 AAUW SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS were introduced at the Durango branch luncheon in October. **Hannah Howard** was awarded the AAUW Virginia Schoser Scholarship. Hannah is a senior at Fort Lewis College - 2016-2017 with a GPA of 3.87. She will be graduating with a degree in Music Performance - violin. She graduated from Bayfield High School in 2007, growing up on a cattle ranch. Her parents started the first Messianic Synagogue in Bayfield. After graduation, Hannah intends to develop a private teaching studio, continue playing with the San Juan Symphony, tour as a performer and continue her education. The Janet Watson Scholarship was awarded to **Demerise Cormier**, a junior at Fort Lewis College. Demerise is a junior at Fort Lewis College - a non-traditional student with a 4.0 GPA. She is majoring in psychology with a minor in cultural anthropology. She plans to study for her Master’s Degree in Counseling. Demerise was nominated for an award in the TRIO Program which is a federally funded program that supports students who have disabilities, low-income and never had a parent graduate from college. Congratulations to these young women.

- -In Houston, I learned that the best season in the city was October. That is what a man, watering his lawn, told Judy and me as we strolled out one evening and found ourselves in a residential area. I didn’t ask what he called the other eleven months.
- -Joan Mikow and I went early to Austin and found it to be a fun city! There was the Mexican Gray Bats to watch, the free city trolley, theater, Governor’s Mansion, the University, State Capitol which, like Texas, was huge.
- -Holding their Convention at the same time in the conference room adjacent to ours at the Doubletree motel in Colorado Springs was the TOPS group (Taking Off Pounds Sensibly). We were startled the first time, then amused thereafter when they would suddenly sing out their “anthem” or “fight song” or whatever ... loudly and with gusto as the morning wore on.

You may ask, “Did the Association’s work get accomplished at these gatherings what with all that was going on?” A definite yes is the answer; agendas were tight and there was always much advance information for delegates to look over. Those wishing to know the particulars of the Conventions and Conferences can find them in the official archives because, as stated, these are just memories.
